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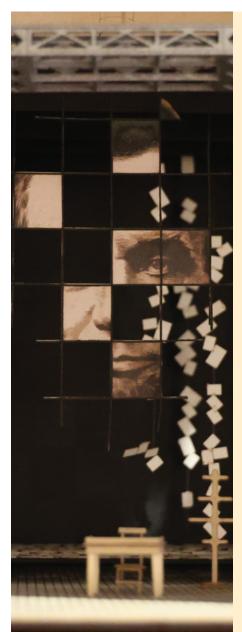

Ford's Theatre explores the legacy of President Abraham Lincoln and celebrates the American experience through theatre and education. A working theatre, historical monument, world-class museum and learning center, Ford's Theatre is the premier destination in Washington, D.C. to explore and celebrate Lincoln's ideals and leadership principles.

Ford's Theatre History

In 1861, theatre manager John T. Ford leased out the abandoned First Baptist Church on Tenth Street to create Ford's Theatre. Over the next few years, the venue became a popular stage for theatrical and musical productions. On April 14, 1865, Abraham Lincoln visited Ford's for a performance of *Our American Cousin*. At this performance, Lincoln was shot by John Wilkes Booth, a Confederate sympathizer and white supremacist. Lincoln died the next morning in the Petersen House, a boarding house located across the street. Ford's Theatre remained dark for more than 100 years, officially reopening in 1968 as a national historic site and working theatre. It is operated through a public-private partnership between the National Park Service and Ford's Theatre Society.

Ford's Theatre Today

Through its inspiring theatrical productions, live historic interpretation and engaging education programs, Ford's Theatre offers visitors the opportunity to immerse themselves in America's past while revealing meaningful connections to today.

As a working theatre, Ford's produces renowned plays, vibrant musicals and newly commissioned works that captivate and entertain while examining political and social issues related to Lincoln's legacy. With works from the Tony-nominated *Come From Away* and the nationally acclaimed *Big River* to the world premieres of *Meet John Doe, The Heavens Are Hung In Black, Liberty Smith, Necessary Sacrifices, The Widow Lincoln, The Guard, Grace* and *Something Moving,* Ford's Theatre is making its mark on the American theatre landscape. With the opening of the Aftermath Exhibits at the Center for Education and Leadership, Ford's Theatre has become a major center for learning, where people of all ages can examine Lincoln's multifaceted legacy through exhibits, workshops and educational programs.

Welcome

Welcome to Ford's Theatre and the opening of our 2024-2025 season. As we began to plan a season that would intersect with a national election, it's no coincidence that we chose Herbert Mitgang's *Mister Lincoln*. Ford's historic stage is intrinsically connected to Abraham Lincoln. One look at the Presidential Box and an overwhelming feeling comes over many of us. When we come to this sacred space, we feel Lincoln's presence. We think about the man he was, the leader he became, and the values he stood for. We kept asking ourselves, what would it feel like to meet President Lincoln today? What would he teach us at this juncture of national discord? Are there historical parallels between Lincoln's time in office and our country today? Could we be reinspired by the man and the lasting power of his words?

Much of the play's eloquent and powerful language comes from Lincoln's own words. In the introduction to the play, Mitgang writes: "Lincoln happened to have been the best writer who ever occupied the White House. He can be placed in the front rank of American writers outside the White House too. Who else could come up with: "They are blowing out the moral lights around us" or call upon Americans, "...to bind up the nation's wounds"? His words were hand-fashioned without a single ghostwriter or pollster to guide his pen or thought."

Mister Lincoln had its American premiere here at Ford's Theatre back in 1980-44 years ago! In reviving this historical play, it is our hope that you'll gain a deeper appreciation for a man who rose from abject poverty in Kentucky to become one of the most consequential presidents in our country's history.

Working on the production has allowed Ford's to have a fruitful collaboration with the children of the playwright, Lee and Laura Mitgang. We are also very fortunate to be welcoming Scott Bakula back to our stage.

Enjoy your time with *Mister Lincoln*, and I hope to see you back at Ford's Theatre throughout our season.

Bringing Lincoln to Life with Stone, Wax and Stage

Washington, D.C. is a city made of monuments to people and the ideas they championed. In its own unique way, Ford's Theatre is part of the capital's monumental pantheon. Here, theatre and education are platforms to explore the American experience as well as Lincoln's life and tragic death. You will experience this mission in action through watching Herbert Mitgang's Mister Lincoln on the Ford's Theatre stage. Most people around the country and the world, however, are more familiar with the public buildings and sculptures carved from stone and metal that define the D.C. landscape. For generations, Americans have passed down the experience of coming face to face with the seemingly immortal faces of American heroes on the National Mall and walking the halls of government. These sensations are a recognition that we too inherit those legacies and possess a piece of that power.

Over the past two centuries, the styles of these commemorations have subtly and not so subtly shifted with each generation. One recent and fascinating example of this evolution was a six-foottall wax replica of the Statue of Abraham Lincoln featured at the Lincoln Memorial sculpted by University of Richmond Professor of Art Sandy Williams IV. First unveiled in D.C. on the site of what was a refugee camp for people fleeing slavery during the Civil War, Williams brought a unique vision to their piece. In contrast to its permanent colossal counterpart on the Mall, Williams's wax memorial came installed with wicks and was meant to be a temporary, interactive piece of public art. Community members were invited to light the wicks. As the piece slowly melted away, participants were invited to reflect on the history of the site, visualize change and have agency over public art.

After its initial deconstruction, a second iteration of Williams's wax Lincoln was ordered and installed in February 2024. It stood until it famously melted under a scorching D.C. sun. This caught the ever enthusiastic eye of the internet, provoking a frenzy of memes and social media posts commenting on its unfortunately deformed, half-melted shape. Williams graciously embraced the diverse responses to their work: "that is what public artwork is about."

Williams's is a modern approach, one that recognizes that our national dialogue with Lincoln has always been a litmus test for who we are as a society. Whether it's through thoughtful reflection, emotional deconstruction or satirical jesting, Americans have always felt an instinctual need to connect with Abraham Lincoln. The story of his life, death and legacy is a stand-in for the dizzying intersection of competing ideas that have been at the heart of American life for centuries.

By experiencing *Mister Lincoln* at Ford's Theatre, you are embarking on your own private dialogue with Abraham Lincoln: You will witness a world-class artist inhabit Lincoln's life and words in the same space, Ford's Theatre, that the real Lincoln came to get in touch with his own humanity. The script of *Mister* Lincoln is made from Lincoln's own words as well as his private and public reflections on himself and his times. This writing, combined with Scott Bakula's acting and commitment to the historical Lincoln, can help you begin to know the triumphs, fears, follies and dreams of Lincoln in a way that his bronze, marble and even wax personas can't do alone. Inert monuments stare at us from the cold infinity of history. On the stage, the life behind another person's eyes meets our own. It takes a human to recreate a human.

As you commune with our collective past during *Mister Lincoln*, we invite you to reflect on Lincoln's humanity as well as your own and that of your fellow theatre goers. We also invite you to imagine the people not portrayed on stage but who lived, struggled and died through that pivotal time with the 16th President. Their own hopes spoke through Lincoln during his life just as they do today through our own struggle to create a more perfect Union. Perhaps the greatest monument we can build is to create a just and lasting peace with our past as well as among ourselves.

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"During our first conversation José mentioned that he wants the world of the show to feel like a museum of Lincoln. A museum requires artifacts, and I started thinking about things which are most remarkable about Lincoln visually and quickly realized that there are essentially two: his writing, meaning the visual manifestation of his letters and words (like most politicians of his time he was primarily a terrific writer) and the man himself, his physical appearance. All the rest is just uninteresting-looking Victoriana... Contemporaries who had met Lincoln, whether they were sympathizers or foes, frequently made remarks about his physical appearance—he had alternatively struck people as strange, majestic, ugly, awkward, idiosyncratic, impressive, so on and so forth; in other words, interesting. So I took those two visual elements—Lincoln's words and Lincoln's face—and made them into a design for this show." -Misha Kachman

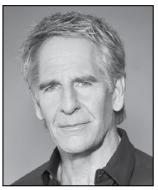

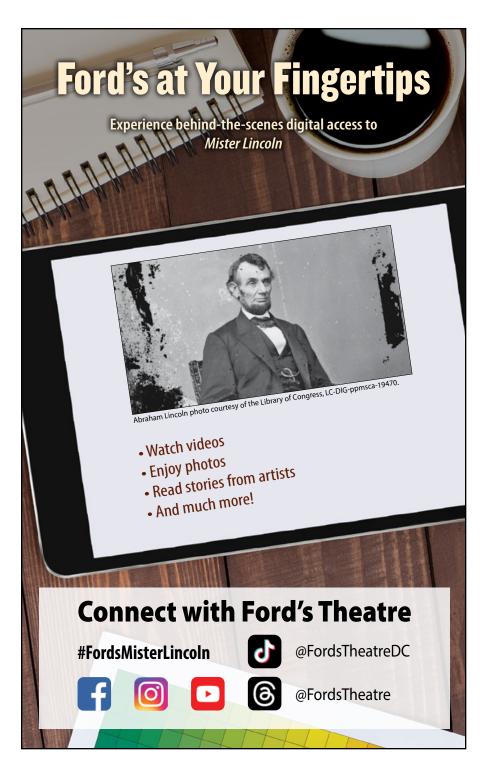

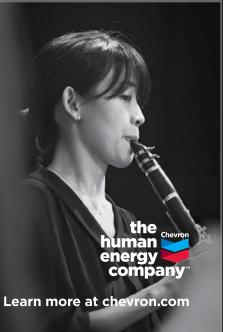

Author of *Mister Lincoln*, was an awardwinning journalist, historian, dramatist, novelist and TV documentarian. During 47 years at *The New York Times*, he served on the editorial board, was a book critic, and helped found the Op-Ed page. A noted Lincoln scholar and Fellow of the Society of American Historians, his 17 books include *Abraham Lincoln: A Press Portrait*, and *The Fiery Trial*. Mitgang also wrote *Adlai*, *Alone*, a play profiling presidential candidate Adlai E. Stevenson. *Mister Lincoln* was first performed at Ford's Theatre in 1980, had a Broadway run, and has appeared in theaters around the U.S. and internationally.

Deputy Director and Director of Programming Since ioining Ford's in 2006, Fox-Siegmund has overseen the creation of the Center for Education and Leadership and the renovation of the historic theatre and museum, as well as the world premiere productions of The Guard, The Widow Lincoln, Necessary Sacrifices, Liberty Smith, Meet John Doe and The Heavens Are Hung In Black. Tetreault served as Managing Director of the Alley Theatre for 10 years, producing more than 100 productions and working with artists such as Edward Albee, Tony Kushner, Trevor Nunn, Nicky Silver, Frank Wildhorn and August Wilson, among others. He has held senior management positions with Crossroads Theatre Company, New Jersey; Berkeley Repertory Theatre, California; and Circle Repertory Company, New York City. He served as Director of Finance at Madison Square Garden and as a vice president with C.W. Shaver and Company, Inc., a New York management and fundraising consulting firm. He has served as a panelist for the National Endowment for the Arts and has taught and guest lectured at Brooklyn College, Columbia University, New York University, the University of Houston and Rice University. He is a graduate of Emerson College and received his MFA from the City University of New York-Brooklyn College. He serves on the Board of the Downtown DC BID.

Getting to Know Lincoln

The play *Mister Lincoln* is a solo show featuring key moments in Lincoln's life as a lawyer and advocate as well as his presidency. Acclaimed television and stage actor Scott Bakula plays the title role and will take you on a journey through history. We will hear about the experiences that shaped him and some of the iconic words he crafted and delivered in letters and speeches.

Abraham Lincoln was born on February 12, 1809, in rural Kentucky. Rising from humble beginnings, Lincoln became a self-taught lawyer and a compelling public speaker. Elected president in 1860, he demonstrated exceptional leadership qualities by steering the nation through the Civil War. History remembers him for his unwavering commitment to preserving the Union and working to establish a "new birth of freedom" in the United States by working with others to use his presidential powers to abolish human slavery.

While Lincoln was an important part of the nation's advances during the Civil War, his leadership style was defined by an ability to make decisions by balancing his own conscience and the needs of others. His approach to the presidency resulted in the

> famous Emancipation Proclamation, which declared freedom for slaves in Confederate-held territories. His Gettysburg Address inspired the Union by expressing the nation's core values of liberty and democracy. Re-elected in 1864, Lincoln continued to push for the 13th Amendment, aiming to permanently abolish slavery nationwide.

All Eyes on You

The contemporary one-person show continues a long tradition of storytelling that has existed across many cultures across the world. There are many types of solo shows such as poetry, stand-up comedy and song performances among others. In theatre, a oneperson show can evolve from a series of monologues that serve to tell a biographical story, either one personally connected to the storyteller or of a figure of current or historical interest to the performer. The playwright can choose to include the voices of other characters or to keep the perspective focused on one character.

Mister Lincoln Student Guide (cont.)

What's Your Story?

Reflect on significant moments of your life where you learned important lessons or achieved milestones and document how these moments have influenced who you are today.

Instructions:

Step One:

• Think about your life journey up to this point. Consider personal, academic and extracurricular experiences. Think about moments that stand out to you—times when you learned something important or achieved something meaningful.

Step Two:

 Choose at least three key moments from any time period in your life. These can be from any time period in your life. These moments could include events like learning a new skill, overcoming a challenge, reaching a personal goal or any experience that had a significant impact on you.

Step Three:

- Reflect on how each of these key moments has influenced who you are today. Consider the following questions:
 - How did this experience change you or your perspective?
 - What skills or knowledge did you gain from this moment?
 - How does this moment continue to impact your decisions, actions or goals?

Step Four:

- Write a brief poem, monologue or speech about the event. Include details about what happened, where it took place, who was involved and why it was significant to you.
- Be creative and honest in your reflections, and make sure to highlight how these key moments have shaped your identity and future aspirations.

Step Five:

• Share your piece with your class or a small group. Use this opportunity to learn from others' experiences and gain new perspectives on your own journey.

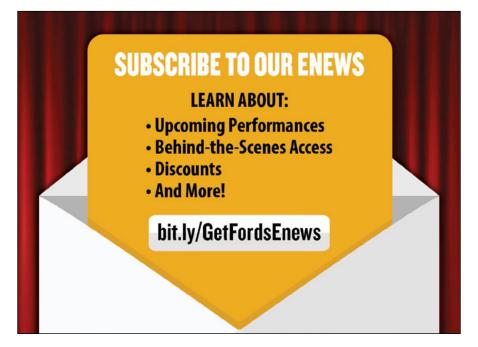

Historic Site Visits

A visit to Ford's Theatre traces the story of Abraham Lincoln's presidency, assassination and legacy. Whether for a brief visit or for the full experience, Ford's will deepen your appreciation and understanding of America's 16th president. Admission is free; advance tickets have a convenience fee. The Ford's Theatre campus traditionally includes:

- **Museum:** Learn about Lincoln's presidency from his inauguration to his arrival at Ford's Theatre the night of April 14, 1865. See artifacts related to his presidency and assassination.
- **Theatre:** See the recreated historic theatre and learn the key facts of the assassination from National Park Service Rangers.
- Petersen House: Explore Lincoln's final moments in the house where Lincoln died.
- **Center for Education and Leadership:** See the Aftermath Exhibits exploring what happened following Lincoln's assassination, the hunt for John Wilkes Booth and the lasting impact of Lincoln's legacy.
